What do you do when partner reverses in the minors? With an extremely strong, albeit misfit, hand, some move must be made towards slam. Two tables seemed to know just where they were going, with an ace-ask sequence culminating in 7NT. A pair stopped in small slam – and lost 13 IMPs for their efforts when the clubs broke.

PRACTICAL BIDDING



1D, Pass, 1H to you...

What's your call?

A strong hand with a good suit, and potentially well positioned honour cards given the heart bid to your right. Sometimes it's right to double on this hand, intending to show spades later. At the table, however, Jane opted for 4♠ – bidding exactly where she thinks she wanted to play.

This attracted a penalty double from her left, all pass. With West's nominal three tricks and East showing some values with the response, this may have seemed a reasonable bet at the time.

Jane would be pleasantly surprised with Cheryl's dummy – it's hard to imagine a better 6 HCP to be held. A fast auction meant the opponents never gauged their double red-suit fit and could not find a sacrifice in 5♦ or 5♥.

NO WAY TO GO WRONG?

Suzy and Jacinda earned a perhaps unexpected 12 IMPs for bidding and making 6♥ sitting East-West. With West's extreme strength, it seems hard to stay under the 6 level – and it would seem that once one is in slam, the absence of the ♥9 means the heart suit should play for just one loser.

With hearts as the trump suit, Jacinda had to approach the suit quickly, and had little choice but to play towards the QT83, and must have been relieved to see North play the ♥K. At two other tables, the slam of choice was instead 6♠, and declarer opted for a failing line of allowing South to win the third round of clubs and hoping they were endplayed, holding the ♥K and ♠J9. When this wasn't the case, they were doomed to lose an eventual heart trick.

It's always better to have multiple chances to make your contract. But sometimes having fewer options also means having fewer chances to make mistakes!

GOOD LUCK, BAD LUCK

Is a singleton Ace a stopper? Perhaps, yes, in the sense that it will stop the opponents running the suit. But having no option to hold up the suit as well as having full control of it in a suit contract can mean it's not ideal. In any case, however, it's probably a much better holding when your partner also reckons they have a stopper.

The opponents bid aggressively to 3H and Dennis had to choose. Perhaps trusting Heather's own NT bid (and declarer play), he bid 3NT, all pass. On the lead of the H4, they were lucky the opponents only had eight hearts – West would need several entries to run the suit.

Even then, their troubles weren't over. The 'normal' play of cashing the CAK yielded only four tricks in the suit. This along with three aces and the DK didn't quite add up to nine. Yet it's not such an easy board to defend. On the run of the clubs, East-West must coordinate protecting the diamonds and the spades. East's fatal misguess in discarding a diamond yielding not just the contract but also an overtrick. Heather and Dennis proved to be the only pair to both be in game and make it, for a gain of 9 IMPs.

They may have been lucky in the defense, but unlucky in receiving fewer "hints" from the opponents than others. At some tables, East found an aggressive weak two opening. Yet with the chances of the finesse and drop being so close to start with (about 50% and 52% respectively), the knowledge of East's six spades and weak hand should lead declarers to finessing West instead for the club.

There's a bridge adage: "If they don't lead a singleton, they don't have one." The singleton lead is both common and powerful, and much of the time, it can be led without thought.

Thinking that only three tricks were needed to defeat Kinga and Carol's game, however, West attempted to cash the DA, only to be greeted with disaster in the dummy.

Although the spade suit still has two nominal losers, East is left with a serious problem once they win a trick. There's no good return with the DA gone, any diamond lead will set up the eleventh trick.

ALERT! ... OR NOT?

In principle, alerts are a very simple matter. You tell the opponents when a bid might not mean what it looks like.

But determining what is “unusual” is never that simple. Some things might be so common (and taught to even beginners) that it seems unnecessary, while in other situations, alerts might help a partnership more than the opponents – wouldn't it be nice if your partner always told you when you had inadvertently made an artificial bid?

A full list of the alert regulations can be found in **Section D – Appendix 7** of the **NZB Manual**. Here, we'll just cover some of the more common exceptions to alerting unusual bids.

All explanations of alerts shouldn't just name a convention or say “standard” – your opponents might not know what that means to you! Try to be as specific as you can. Bridge can be a game of deception, but not in this regard!

DO ALERT!

- Bids that show a natural suit *and* **another**
 - 5 of a major, 4+ of a minor
 - Fit-showing jumps
- Bids that aren't **forcing** – but might look that way!
 - Responder's weak jump shifts
 - Non-forcing suit responses to openings
 - Pre-emptive raises of openings
- Bids that **“don't really mean anything”**
 - “Forced” bids, including some completed transfers and 3C after a Lebensohl 2NT

DON'T ALERT!

“Self-Alerting” Bids

Some bids are virtually *always* unusual, and it's up to the opponents to ask if they wish to know. These include:

- All **Doubles** and **Redoubles**
- **“Cue bids”** – bids of any denomination that the opponents have already shown or used
- Any bids at the **4 level** and above
 - *Except* artificial openings
- 2C **“Game Force”**
- 2C **“Simple Stayman”** over 1NT openings
 - Yes, this means you alert a natural 2C!

Important Information for Team Participation

Please Note: Players on each team should be from the same club.

1. The competition will be conducted online over nine Friday evenings throughout 2026 via RealBridge, organized by the Auckland Bridge Club.
2. C-Point Masterpoints will be awarded for individual matches, but not for overall final rankings.
3. There will be three groups based on players' grades at the start of 2026: Junior, Intermediate, and Open. Players are allowed to compete at a higher level than their current ranking. Clubs may enter multiple teams in any grade and are not required to participate in all three grades.
4. There are no fixed partnerships or team compositions. We encourage maximum participation, meaning that a "team of four" may include many players (from the same club) throughout the year.
5. Systems must align with NZB guidelines at each level. While system cards are not mandatory, pre-alerting, announcing, and alerting partner's bids are expected. It is advisable to include a brief description of your system at the beginning of a match in the chat, for example, "1NT=12-14, 1C=4+, 4CM, high encourage."
6. A fee of \$9 per session will be charged to cover running costs, Masterpoint fees to NZB, RealBridge levies, and the Directors' expenses. This fee will be deducted from players' AKBC HelloClub Accounts.
7. Youth players can pre-register for eligibility to pay a reduced table fee of \$1 per session by selecting the "Youth Player" option.
8. The competition will proceed subject to a minimum of 30 entries from all clubs.

Late withdrawals and/or defaults can create significant challenges on RealBridge. We kindly ask clubs to take measures to avoid such situations. If necessary, a player from another club may be permitted as a substitute.

PRACTICE SESSION

Practice Session for New RealBridge Players

A practice session for those new to RealBridge will take place on Friday, March 13th, at 7:15pm

- The link to join will be available on AKBC's RealBridge page.
- If you can't make it to this session or desire additional practice, you can book a "Taster" session on the RealBridge website for a time slot in the New Zealand time zone.

The staff at RealBridge are fantastic and will help ensure you feel comfortable playing online. However, please be aware that there are only a limited number of time slots available. It's also recommended that players read all the information on the RealBridge page and conduct the camera and microphone tests beforehand.

TEAM CAPTAINS - HOW TO REGISTER YOUR TEAM

- a) entries on NZB Website (see March 20) with just the team "captain" name appearing. The team members may vary throughout the year.
- b) clubs outside of our region may enter
- c) all players must be from the same club (exception for one- night emergencies as defaults should be avoided).

FORMAT

Entry Guidelines and Auckland Bridge Club Support Notes

The number of entries will determine the specific format.

1. Matches will utilise IMP scoring. NZB Masterpoints will be awarded for each successful match.
2. The goal is for all four groups to play the same boards, facilitating future discussions within your club. RealBridge allows players to review hands at their convenience.
3. Players should be seated by 7pm. A link will be available on the AKBC website. This is the sole access point for each session, and the links are updated monthly.
4. It's crucial that players log in using the same name and number for each session. Ensure that the spelling matches exactly with your name on NZ Bridge.

Auckland Bridge Club Support Notes

The links for each Interclub evening will be displayed on the Auckland Bridge Club's RealBridge page. Players need to scroll down to find the purple links and select the appropriate link for their Interclub grade. The links will become active at 6:45 PM, and we encourage players to log in early to help us identify any missing participants. Once logged in, players do not need to stay in front of their computers until the session starts; we simply need to confirm their presence.

Players must sit at the table that corresponds with their team number, facing their partner, upon logging into RealBridge. They will be moved from that position once play commences.

The fee is \$9 per evening, or \$1 for Youth (to qualify as a youth player, one must have been born in 1999 or later). Payments will be processed through Auckland Bridge Club's HelloClub system, which recognises each player by their NZB number and automatically charges the appropriate amount.

For players without an Auckland Bridge Club HelloClub account, they must create one. Please visit the www.akbc.co.nz website, click on the Visitors tab, and select "Join as Casual Player (online play only)." Youth players should choose the "Join as Youth Player (online play only)" option.

If you require assistance with setting up an account, feel free to email or call the club at 09 524-5562. The office is open on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

Players can monitor their transactions anytime by logging into their HelloClub account and navigating to the Finance section. Once your account balance reaches zero, an automated reminder to replenish funds will be sent to you via email.

Requirements for the Certificate of Achievement

To be awarded the certificate, you are required to

1. Complete all modules and satisfactorily complete the lesson quizzes (and/or other required activities), and the module quizzes .Unlimited attempts allowed until a minimum score of 80% is achieved

2. Pass the Online Completion Quiz

20 open-book questions Must be completed within 6 months of starting the course .Each attempt must be completed within 2 hours.
Repeatable until a 80% pass mark is achieved

3. Participate in 2 Practical Training Sessions

You should arrange for this with a suitably qualified director from your club or region. We shall send the requirements to your selected supervisor who will guide you and assess your practical directing skills during these sessions

Assessment results are reported to the course administrators

Participate in two online practical sessions (dates to be confirmed)
