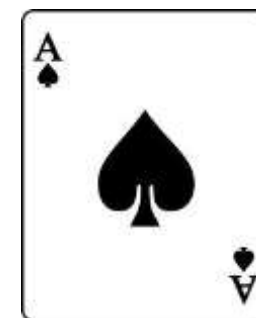

Why Play Bridge?

If you're wondering if bridge is for you; or if you've always wanted to learn but have been afraid it's too difficult -- here are some of the reasons why millions of people around the world are hooked on this fascinating game.

Bridge is an Absorbing Pastime

- A hand of Bridge takes 5-7 minutes to play and you can play as many hands as you have time in a session. At Howick this is approximately 24-27 per 3 hour session.
- Every hand is different.
- It is comparatively easy to learn (especially if you play other card games), but harder to play well.

Bridge is a Partnership Game

- Bridge requires you to develop a relationship (a system) with your partner.
- Not only do you have a partner but you may also have team mates.
- Bridge also involves communication with your opponents.
- There's a special camaraderie among bridge players that is developed from the games emphasis on teamwork, ethics and sportsmanship.



Bridge is Fun

- Probably the most important reason to play. It offers the suspense of Poker, the cerebral qualities of Chess and the excitement of Sport all in a social setting that allows you to challenge yourself and gives you the feeling of accomplishment when you make that daring bid (and pull it off!), or a successful play.



Bridge Encourages Creativity

- The game of Bridge is learnt by using a specified system, however once the system is learnt and understood, players can develop their own add-ons to 'their' system.

Bridge is Social



- Bridge is primarily played at the Bridge Club, but can also be played at home socially.
 - As with other Sport, Tournament play occurs locally, regionally or nationally.



Bridge Stimulates the Brain

- Bridge is one of the best ways to practice the 'use it or lose it' advice for maintaining mental sharpness.
- Research has shown that regular bridge playing improves reasoning skills, concentration, and long & short term memory.
- According to a study from the University of California at Berkeley, Bridge also measurably strengthens the immune system.
- Often called the 'game for a lifetime' – no matter how many years you play – you will always find new challenges and the learning process never ends.

Bridge is Inexpensive

- All you need is a pack of cards, pencils, some paper and three other people.
- If you have a computer and the internet you can join thousands of other bridge players from around the world online – or you can simply play on your own software.
- You can play bridge at the **Howick Bridge Club** where you can play for three hours for slightly more than a cup of coffee. (We even give you a coffee....or tea)
